




#### MISSION STATEMENT

#### COVID-19 UPDATE

The government of Manitoba offered a onetime grant providing financial assistance during the COVID-19 pandemic. This grant is also considered an extension of funding if necessary.



## A WORD FROM THE CURATOR

Although our board was officially formed in 2018, as curator, I have been collecting items since 2014. Some of our items can be seen in the Winnipeg Police Museum.

We are in the process of photographing, documenting and properly storing our already growing collection of artifacts. Pictures and documents are slowly being scanned and preserved.

We have reached out to various newspapers to spread the word out to the community about the museum as well as sent out letters to some known retired staff. Plans are to continue reaching out to the communities through new social media feeds such as Facebook, Instagram and a new museum webpage.



#### TREASURER'S REPORT

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### COMMUNITY EDUCATION AND EVENTS

As part of its Mission Statement, the Corrections Museum has made some significant strides in terms of Community Education. The Museum has established a website and both an Instagram and Facebook account. We are looking for a home for the Corrections Museum but in the meantime, we have established a virtual Museum of sorts to get the word out about our museum as well as have the opportunity to educate the public of some featured items we have acquired for the Museum.

The Corrections Museum has also been invited to the Red River Heritage Fair but was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Corrections Museum hosted an aid station in the Winnipeg Police Half Marathon and was assisted by volunteers from the OPP and the Cameron Highlanders.

In addition to touring Ireland, the Curator had the opportunity to visit Portage Ia Prairie and speak with Mayor Irvine Ferris and retired Superintendent Terry Remple about the now closed Aggasiz Youth Centre and the Museum's quest for information.

### AGASSIZ YOUTH CENTRE CLOSURE

Officially opened as Agassiz Youth Centre in 1977 and closed in July of 2022. Originally this building was opened in 1910 as an Industrial Training School.

Manitoba has seen a significant decrease in the number of youth in custody since 2012, similar to other provinces in Canada, Justice Minister Kelvin Goertzen said. The closure of the facility will allow the province to increase capacity in northern Manitoba, Goertzen says.

Between 1908 and 1909, a four-storey stone and brick building, designed by provincial architect <u>Samuel Hooper</u>, was constructed by the Snyder Brothers on the edge of the <u>Portage la Prairie</u>, beside Crescent Lake, as a home for the Industrial Training School.

Modeled on the Minnesota Training School at Red Wing, Minnesota, the facility opened its doors in February 1910 with the transfer to its custody of 20 boys from the <u>Central District</u> <u>Gaol</u>. It was intended as a facility to deal with "juvenile delinquents" and others by giving them work-related training, with instruction in tailoring, shoe-making, gardening, carpentry, blacksmithing, baking, cooking, farming, and sewing. Later, other buildings were added nearby, some of which still remain at the site. In 1931, it was renamed the Manitoba Home for Boys.

During the Second World War, the site was taken over by the Canadian military, forcing the staff and boys to move to temporary quarters at <u>Carman</u> and the No. 3 Forestry Camp at the <u>Whiteshell Forest Reserve</u>. They returned to Portage la Prairie after the war. A school was also operated at the site to provide elementary and high school education to those incarcerated, known most commonly as Manitoba Home for Boys School, it was properly named Lakeview Institute (also known as Lakeview School) and operated as a Special School [sometimes listed as within School Division 99].

Known as the Agassiz Youth Centre since 1977, the 59-acre site was operated by the Manitoba government as a youth correctional centre for young offenders.

It was partially demolished in December 2022.
